The Dinner Party

Quinquennial XVII (2012) ("Q") opened with a sit down dinner on Tuesday July 3rd, before, during and after which there were many hugs, kisses and shouts of joy as we were reconnecting with people we have met over the years at quinquennials and national formation workshops. We met new members of the family and became excited to meet and sometimes share a meal with some of the rock stars in our Franciscan family: Minister General, Encarnación del Pozo OFS, Keynote speakers: Sr. Ilia Delio, OSF, Ed Shirley, OFS, († August 2012), Br. Bill Short, OFM, Pat Brandwein-Ball, OFS, St. Francis Region's own rock star, Fr. Stephen Gross, OFM, Conv.

At Friday's liturgy, the presider was Fr. Lester Bach, OFM Cap. Yes, that rock star, author of *The Franciscan Journey* and many other publications that have helped form and transform many of us. The Gospel was Matthew 9: 8-13.

In his homily, first, Fr. Lester asked us to imagine being at a dinner party. That was easy. We had been having wonderful dinners, in good company with great conversation. Next, he introduced the other guests and asked us to reflect quietly on our reactions, on learning who the other guests were: A gay man and his partner, an ex-communicated Jew, and someone of another faith who did not believe in the Resurrection. Definitely not people we had been shearing meals with at the "Q".

Then, he read from Article #13 of our Rule of 1978.

As the Father sees in every person the features of his Son, the first-born of many brothers and sisters, so the Secular Franciscans with a gentle and courteous spirit accept all people as a gift of the Lord and an image of Christ....

Finally, we were reminded that Secular Franciscans are to present to the world the merciful face of the Church and if during the time of reflection on the presence of the other guests at table, we found something that was not quite on target with the Gospel, then we need some conversion. We need to learn the meaning of the words: "*I desire mercy, not sacrifice.*" Mat 9:13.

There are no words adequate to convey to you the joy, the intellectual stimulation, the sheer delight in meeting old friends that one receives when attending a Quinquennial celebration. One of the most powerful presentations I've heard was Sr. Ilia Delio's first talk the morning of July 4, 2012. There were so many thoughts presented in her talk that I can't begin to cover them all in a short article, so I will just highlight a few of them.

The world is not poor; it is rich in God's goodness. The goodness is in the heart of the world. Our call is to name the good that is already there, not to turn evil into good. To do that, we first have to find the goodness in ourselves. Poverty, humility, and charity mark everything that is good. What fills us inwardly must be shown outwardly. It's not how we pray, nor what we do nor how we do it. It's how we experience the reality of Jesus in our life.

Franciscan Gospel life is: (1) focus on Christ; (2) naming the good; (3) witnessing to God's love. To do that we need to live the "P-C" life: Penance - conversion; poverty - contemplation; piety - compassion. In penance - conversion, we must turn from self-centeredness to God-centeredness. It involves two conversions: the first is from "I" to "it" and the second is from "I" to "thou" - in other words, from being focused on *things* to being focused on *relationships*.

Poverty does not mean living without things, but without *possessing* things. Possessive power

makes true communication between persons impossible. We need to live without possessing "things", which includes not possessing things like hurts, feelings, and thoughts. Poverty is the sister of humility, meaning we have two feet on the ground, and can love and care for one another. The contemplation that is made possible when we truly do not possess things is a way of life, not a style of prayer. In the act of contemplation we hand ourselves over to God, and have a vision of truth which leads to love. We are always centered on the crucified Christ.

Compassion is the quivering of the heart in response to another's suffering. It brings healing to the heart. There is no true love of God and neighbor without true love of oneself. We must see the love of God and Jesus and *become* that love to each other. Then we will always *be* there for each person we meet.

What does an evangelical person do or look like? That person (1) prays; (2) experiences conversion and conversation with God and with others; (3) is a prophetic witness; (4) celebrates the gift of God's goodness; (5) lives according to the Gospel and bears witness to the Gospel; and (6) incarnates the Word of God through poverty, humility, compassion, mercy and crucified love. We must be a sign, a symbol, and give witness by our lives. We must allow the love of Christ to live in us.

The 2012 Quinquennial Congress provided time for learning. She told us how we can discern what to do, how we had the ability to get in touch with God, with ourselves and with others, and where we could find answers and direction. We are no longer isolated individuals or fraternities.

Being Franciscan is something we live, not something we put on and take off.

Then she told us to "Start the Journey". There was no value to the Quinquennial if we did not bring this back to our fraternities and to the world.

She spoke from the heart and expects us to do the same. That is how we will change the world.

Mis queridos hermanos y hermanas, es tiempo de tener un momento de reflexión y pensar en lo que nuestro Santo Papa Benedicto XVI nos invita al entregar a todo el pueblo de Dios su carta "*Porta Fidei*" o sobre el "*Año de la Fé*" en la cual nos invita no solamente a conocer más sobre nuestra Fé sino sobre la manera de vivirla.

Nosotros como Franciscanos seculares, comprometidos no solamente con las enseñanzas de la Iglesia sino a vivir el Evangelio de nuestro Señor Jesucristo; tenemos que empezar a prepararnos para poder incluir estos mensajes y esta invitación no solamente de manera individual sino también dentro del proceso de formación de nuestras Fraternidades para que ayuden a nuestros hermanos a crecer todavía más en poder vivir su Fé.

Deseo compartir con ustedes unos párrafos de esa carta, invitándolos a que la lean completa, para poder incluir la invitación que nos hace en nuestra vida diaria y en el compartimiento de nuestra Fé con aquellos que no la conocen aún llamandose católicos.

" ... Deseamos que este *Año* suscite en todo creyente la aspiración a *confesar* la fe con plenitud y renovada convicción, con confianza y esperanza. Será también una ocasión propicia para intensificar la *celebración* de la fe en la liturgia, y de modo particular en la Eucaristía, que es «la cumbre a la que tiende la acción de la Iglesia y también la fuente de donde mana toda su fuerza»[14]. Al mismo tiempo, esperamos que el *testimonio* de vida de los creyentes sea cada vez más creíble. Redescubrir los contenidos de la fe profesada, celebrada, vivida y rezada[15], y reflexionar sobre el mismo acto con el que se cree, es un compromiso que todo creyente debe de hacer propio, sobre todo en este *Año*.

No por casualidad, los cristianos en los primeros siglos estaban obligados a aprender de memoria el *Credo*. Esto les servía como oración cotidiana para no olvidar el compromiso asumido con el bautismo. San Agustín lo recuerda con unas palabras de profundo significado, cuando en un *sermón* sobre la *redditio symboli*, la entrega del *Credo*, dice: «El símbolo del sacrosanto misterio que recibisteis todos a la vez y que hoy habéis recitado uno a uno, no es otra cosa que las palabras en las que se apoya sólidamente la fe de la Iglesia, nuestra madre, sobre la base inmovible que es Cristo el Señor. [...] Recibisteis y recitasteis algo que debéis retener siempre en vuestra mente y corazón y repetir en vuestro lecho; algo sobre lo que tenéis que pensar cuando estáis en la calle y que no debéis olvidar ni cuando coméis, de forma que, incluso cuando dormís corporalmente, vigiléis con el corazón»[16].

13. A lo largo de este *Año*, será decisivo volver a recorrer la historia de nuestra fe, que contempla el misterio insondable del entrecruzarse de la santidad y el pecado. Mientras lo primero pone de relieve la gran contribución que los hombres y las mujeres han ofrecido para el crecimiento y desarrollo de las comunidades a través del testimonio de su vida, lo segundo debe suscitar en cada uno un sincero y constante acto de conversión, con el fin de experimentar la misericordia del Padre que sale al encuentro de todos.

Espero que todos juntos podamos caminar y vivir de una manera diferente este año de la fe que se acerca y que de una manera especial nos ayude a buscar la santificación de nuestras vidas, dando testimonio de Don que Francisco de Asís nos ha regalado al habernos llamado a esta Orden.
